

Storage of unsecured firearms at home puts California veterans at greater risk of injury



In 2020, 3 in 5 (61%) California veterans who died by suicide used a firearm, according to the California Department of Public Health. A UCLA Center for Health Policy Research study analyzes access to firearms, firearm storage practices, and mental health among veterans in the state.

How veterans stored firearms at home, 2021







Mental health status among veterans who had firearms at home, 2021

said they had ever seriously thought about suicide

1 in 5

who reported any lifetime suicide ideation had a firearm at home that was loaded and unlocked
